Privacy Notice and Request for Confidential Status of Directory Information

In accordance with institutional policy and the U.S. Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), the University of Nevada, Reno vigorously protects the privacy of student education records. The institution does not release private records of individual students, such as grades and class schedules, without prior written consent of the student.

As permitted under federal law, the sole exception to the above practice is the release of "directory" information considered to be public in nature and not generally deemed to be an invasion of privacy. At the University of Nevada, Reno, the following categories are defined as "directory" information: student name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and athletics (including Greek organizations), weight and height measurements for members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, enrollment status (full-, half- or part-time; undergraduate or graduate), degrees and awards received, and listings of the most recent educational agency or institution attended.

Students have the right to request non-disclosure of directory information. If they do not restrict release of this information, it is probable that the information will be released or disclosed. The University of Nevada, Reno uses directory information for non-commercial, educational purposes, such as to mail notices to students about changes in policies, services, or opportunities. Directory information may also be provided for commercial purposes to businesses affiliated with the institution, honor societies, the alumni association and foundation, or other individuals for purposes that may be beneficial to students. The institution exercises discretion in responding to requests for directory information and may or may not provide such information when requested, depending on the intended purpose of the request. The institution does not sell or rent student information for a fee.

It is important to consider carefully the potential consequences of restricting the release of directory information. If a student restricts release for non-commercial educational purposes, the institution will be unable to place the student's name in publications such as honors and graduation programs; to confirm graduation and dates of attendance to potential employers; to verify enrollment with organizations such as insurance companies; or to send notifications about specialized scholarships without the express written authorization of the student.

If, after due consideration, you wish to restrict the release of directory information, complete this form and submit it to the Office of Admissions and Records. This directive will apply permanently to your record until you choose to reverse it by submitting a written authorization.

Application for Admission Instructions

University of Nevada, Reno

Returning Students

Students returning to the university after an absence of one or more semesters are required to resubmit an application for admission. Graduate students must have a leave of absence approved by their department and the Graduate School to be reinstated in an advanced degree program. Each individual who attends another educational institution since last enrolling at the university must submit official transcripts from each school attended whether credit was earned or not.

Non-degree

An individual who is not admitted to a degree program is defined as a non-degree student. Individuals who have earned a bachelor's degree are not eligible for non-degree status. A non-degree student may register for a maximum of 8 undergraduate semester credits per semester. Although there is no limit to the number of credits that may be earned as a non-degree student, a maximum of 32 semester credits is acceptable toward a baccalaureate degree. Non-degree students are not eligible for financial aid, including student loans.

Graduate Special

The graduate special classification is for students who have earned a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution and who wish to take graduate courses but do not plan to pursue a program leading to an advanced degree, or for applicants who do not meet the requirements for admission to regular graduate standing. Admission to graduate special status does not constitute admission to graduate standing in the graduate school. With graduate special classification, a student may enroll for undergraduate or graduate credit and may satisfy the teacher certificate requirements. Although there is no limit to the number of credits that may be earned as a graduate special student, a maximum of 9 semester credits may be applied toward a program of study. Graduate Special students are not eligible for financial aid, including student loans.

Admission Requirements

The following items are required for admission.

1. A completed **Application for Admission** dated and signed.
2. **Application Fee:** A non-refundable application fee is required for all *NEW* students. No fee is required for returning students, as long as the student paid the admission fee while previously enrolled at the university. Submit the fee payment directly to the Cashiers Office.
3. **Immunization:** Official documentation for two doses of measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) and a diphtheria/tetanus (DT) within the last ten years. If you were born prior to 1957, documentation of an MMR is not required. If documentation is not received, a registration hold may be placed on your records.
4. **Residency Status:** Individuals eligible for in-state resident fees are required to submit an application for resident fees along with their admission application.
5. **Transcripts:** Official transcripts are required for *returning students* from each institution attended since last enrolling at the university.

Note: An applicant who gains admission on the basis of incomplete or fraudulent credentials or misrepresentation in the written Application for Admission shall have admission and registration cancelled without refund of any fees, the total credits rescinded that have been earned following such admission, and future registration at the university prohibited.



Be Advised!

Academic advising is a highly beneficial component of your education at the University of Nevada and a critical part of your university experience.

As a student, you need to meet regularly with an assigned academic advisor.

If you are a freshman (new Fall 2008 or incoming Spring 2009), you must meet with your advisor prior to registration. A registration hold has been placed on your account and will be removed only after you met with your advisor.

An advisor can help you:

- Make smart choices about which courses to take
- Understand the requirements for majors and minors offered at Nevada
- Develop educational and career goals suited to your demonstrated abilities and expressed interests
- Understand academic and administrative policies and procedures
- Find resources available on campus to assist you in meeting your goals and objectives

Children of University of Nevada, Reno alumni who graduated with a bachelor's degree, and who reside outside the state of Nevada, are eligible for this reduced nonresident tuition benefit when enrolling in undergraduate studies at the university. **This charge is in addition to the per-credit registration fees (listed in the "Costs" section).**

WUE Reduced Nonresident Tuition\$200.25 per credit

Students who are admitted to the University of Nevada, Reno under the Western Undergraduate Exchange Program pay 150% of the in-state registration fees (\$133.50 per credit plus \$66.75).

Senior Citizen Discounts

Students 62 years of age or older may register without paying per-credit registration fees. Special course fees, nonresident tuition (if applicable) and deposits are not waived. Senior citizen registration does not entitle a person to any privileges usually associated with registration, such as student association membership, health service, or intercollegiate athletic tickets.

Paying Fees and Room and Board

Bills

You will receive one bill. It will reflect your registration record and room and board charges as of **July 25, 2008**. You should receive this bill during the week of August.

Your Mailing Address

Make sure the Office of Admissions and Records has your correct address on file. You may change your address on ePAWS yourself.

Fee Holds

Fee holds are outstanding financial obligations owed to the university. You must clear all fee holds before you can register or request official transcripts. Clear your account at the Cashier's Office. (775) 784-6915.

Late Registration Fees

- If you are registering or paying for classes (one or more credits) from Aug. 25 -Sept. 4, you will be assessed late registration fees.

Deferred Payment—Fees, Room and Board

You may choose a deferred fee payment plan if you have registered for seven credits or more. To select the deferred payment plan, log in to ePAWS and select Deferred Payment.

- 50 percent of your per-credit registration fee, nonresident tuition (if applicable), room and board and 100 percent of special fees are due by Aug. 22; 2008
- The next installment (25 percent) is due Oct. 3 (no bill will be sent);
- The last installment (25 percent) is due Oct. 30 (no bill will be sent).

You will be assessed a 10 percent penalty if you do not make the correct payment on the appropriate dates.

Refund Policies

Dropping Individual Classes:

- 100 percent refund if completed before 5 p.m., Sept. 4. Refunds are mailed two weeks after the deadline.
- No refunds for dropping individual classes after Sept. 4.
- Last day to drop individual classes is Oct. 17.
- Students may drop courses during the first eight weeks of the semester. If a course is dropped between the sixth day of classes and the end of the eighth week of classes, a grade of “W” appears on a student’s transcript.

No student may drop a course to avoid discipline for academic dishonesty or a violation of the academic standards policy. If a course is dropped before discipline is imposed, any “W” may be changed to an “F”.

Total Withdrawal From the 2008 Fall Semester:

- 100 percent if completed by Sept. 4—no exit interview required.
- 50 percent from Sept. 5-Oct. 3—no exit interview required.
- No refunds after Oct. 3.
- An exit interview is required for total withdrawals from the 2008 Fall Semester completed after Oct. 17. Please call (775) 784-6326 to schedule an exit interview.
- Refunds (100 percent) for total withdrawals are mailed within 4 to 6 weeks.
- Refunds (50 percent) for total withdrawals are mailed within 2 to 3 weeks. Refund includes only class(es) that the student is enrolled in at the time the total withdrawal is made. This refund does not include courses dropped prior to the date of a total withdrawal from the university.

NOTE: To be eligible for a refund check, whether at 100 or 50 percent, you must have paid tuition and fees in full.

Nonresident Tuition and Good Neighbor Tuition:

- 100 percent refund for drops or withdrawals completed by Sept. 4.
- 50 percent refund if you complete a total withdrawal between Sept. 5 -Oct. 3.
- No refunds after Oct. 3.

NOTE: To be eligible for a refund check, whether at 100 or 50 percent, you must have paid tuition and fees in full.

Special Course Fees

Your payments for special course fees are 100 percent refundable if you drop courses by Sept. 4. Special course fee refunds after Sept. 4 are at the discretion of the offering department.

- you will not be allowed to register in subsequent semesters
- you cannot get your official transcripts

If you decide not to attend, please drop all your classes by 5 p.m., Sept. 4, 2008 using ePAWS to avoid the \$250 no-show fee.

If you register or make changes to your registration after July 25, 2008 you will not receive an adjusted bill in the mail. Use the account balance inquiry function on the ePAWS system (see page 11 for directions) to determine the amount owed.

Financial Aid and Scholarship Information

Disbursements

Your bill from the Cashier's Office will not reflect any aid awarded to you because it is printed before federal regulation allows funds to be transferred to your student account to pay outstanding financial obligations. That transfer of funds will begin Aug. 15 for students who are registered for the appropriate number and level of credits. Once the account is paid with the aid, any remaining balance will be mailed to you at the address on file with the Office of Admissions and Records beginning on Aug. 20. If the amount of aid is less than what you owe, you must pay the balance or make arrangements with the Cashier's Office for deferred payment. Remember when you receive your check that Stafford loan fees were deducted.

To ensure that your aid is disbursed at the start of the semester, all of the following requirements **MUST BE MET**:

1. Register before Aug. 13 for the appropriate number and level of credits for which your aid was approved. Aid will not transfer until you are registered for sufficient credits or had your aid approved at a reduced enrollment.
2. Make all changes to your class schedule before Aug. 13.
3. Met the "satisfactory academic progress" standards for aid eligibility.
4. Submitted your complete *loan activation form* to Student Financial Services before July 15.
5. Signed and returned your Stafford *promissory note* (if required by the lender) by Aug. 1.
6. Verified with the donor that the scholarship check was mailed mailed by Aug. 1.

IF YOU FILED THE FAFSA AFTER JULY 1, OR IF YOUR LOAN WAS APPROVED BY THE LENDER AFTER AUG. 1, FUNDS MAY NOT BE AVAILABLE WHEN CLASSES BEGIN. PLEASE MAKE PLANS TO PAY YOUR FEES OR ARRANGE FOR DEFERRED PAYMENT WITH THE CASHIER'S OFFICE.

Institutional Refund Policy

Any refund of institutional costs (tuition, fees, and university room and board) for all recipients of aid and general scholarship funds must be returned to those programs before the student receives any refund. If you drop credits and receive a 100% refund, your aid will be adjusted and you may have to repay funds. Additional aid or the reinstatement of aid for credits added after Sept. 4 is subject to the type and availability of funds. After Sept. 4 any drop creates a credit deficiency.

Return of Financial Aid Funds

When the student ceases class attendance during a semester, the university is required to calculate the amount of financial aid funds that must be returned to the aid programs. This calculation uses calendar days that the student was in attendance compared to the total calendar days of the semester. Generally when a student receives aid in excess of calculated expenses she/he will most likely be subject to a return of some of those funds.

It is a consortium of over 575 colleges and universities, yet tailored for the University of Nevada, Reno. Students register at no cost and then, using sophisticated search tools, identify potential opportunities to which they may apply. Students can post their resume and work samples (i.e., writing samples, portfolios). Employers can review student resumes and work samples as well as contact students for follow-up information. Through Career Navigator, students can participate in the Virtual Job Fair, which is an online job fair that connects students with employers who have part-time jobs for students while students attend UNR. Professional and Graduate School Planning:

Professional and Graduate School Planning (PGSP) program is a centralized, “major neutral” service for all students and all majors interested in pursuing post-baccalaureate education. The office has:

- a library of resources dealing with health and legal career opportunities, professional school directories;

The PGSP program also coordinates the Professional and Graduate School Fair, which attracts over 60 universities from across the country each fall semester to recruit UNR students to their graduate and professional school programs.

On-campus and off-campus employment opportunities for students

In addition to the five programs above, Career Development also assists students who are looking for on-campus and off-campus work, as well as part-time and full-time work opportunities. Students simply need to log onto Career Navigator: <http://www.unr.edu/career/jobs>. All campus and off-campus employment opportunities for students are posted on Career Navigator. Employers (on-campus or off-campus) seeking to hire students also use Career Navigator to post jobs.

This service for campus and community employment is offered to assist students in finding work-study and other student positions while enrolled. Students must meet academic credit and grade-point average requirements to be eligible. Students enrolled less than half-time may not be employed through this service.

Federal work-study is a “need-based” program; interested students must complete the FAFSA at www.fafsa.ed.gov to qualify. Students must meet the general eligibility criteria for financial aid.

International students on F-1 and J-1 visas must be enrolled full-time and may work up to 20 hours a week during periods of enrollment, according to United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) guidelines. The Office of International Students and Scholars is available to assist with questions.

The University of Nevada, Reno is fully accredited by the Department of Veterans Affairs for education benefits to qualified veterans under existing, applicable public laws. Honorably discharged veterans, or those currently in service who plan to attend the university must apply for veterans' education benefits when they pay registration fees.

The university is also accredited for dependents and spouses under Chapter 35, Title 38, USC (a program of financial assistance for the education of men and women whose parents or spouses are deceased or 100% disabled as a result of military service).

Information on assistance under the Veterans Educational and Vocational Rehabilitation Program is available upon request from the Veteran Services Office, 784-4700 option 5 (for assistance calls only), or at www.unr.edu/stsv/veteran/. Students desiring to receive benefits under any of the public laws pertaining to veterans or their spouses/dependents must complete the Veterans Educational Benefits Application. Students should expect a 30 to 45 day processing delay for initial applications before receiving educational benefits. Transfer students who have been,

and wish to continue receiving education benefits must complete a Request for Change of Program or Place of Training form when transferring from another institution. Transfer students may expect a delay of 7 to 10 days before receiving their benefits.

Disability Resource Center

The purpose of the Disability Resource Center (DRC) is to ensure that students with disabilities have equal access to participate in, contribute to, and benefit from all university programs. Counseling Services

Personal Counseling

These services include: assessment, referral, consultation, and individual, couples, and group psychological counseling. Students present for an initial assessment (intake), at which time, the counselor makes a recommendation for one of the following: individual psychotherapy, group/couples psychotherapy, or community referral. Treatment is based on a brief therapy model. At certain times of the year, there may be a waitlist for individual therapy. Typical student concerns include: adjustment problems, interpersonal issues, depression, and anxiety. Some of the groups offered include: relationship loss, motivational enhancement, emotion regulation, interpersonal effectiveness, thesis and dissertation support, anxiety management, body image, and general psychotherapy and support groups. All counseling sessions and records are confidential and comply with the new HIPAA requirements. An appointment may be made by calling (775) 784-4648, or by visiting 202, Thompson Building. These services are not affiliated with, and do not report to, any academic or disciplinary office on campus.

Substance Abuse Treatment Program

The substance abuse treatment program from the university's Counseling Services is responsible for providing assessment, referral, intervention, individual and group counseling services for students who have developed alcohol, tobacco, and other drug problems. Workshops, in-service trainings, "safe-ride" vouchers,

safe party information, breathalyzers, and consultation services are also available. Educational programs about substance abuse may be sponsored in conjunction with recognized student groups living on campus (residence halls, fraternities, sororities, etc.), ASUN, GSA, and other campus organizations. All services and information are confidential.

Testing Services

Testing Services schedules and administers national and institutional tests (GRE, LSAT, MCAT, PRAXIS, PCAT, TSE) that are required for admission to undergraduate and graduate programs and professional schools. International Students and Scholars

The Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS) provides a variety of services to the university community. The OISS staff provides advisement on immigration matters; conducts orientation meetings for international students and scholars; issues documents for students, faculty and their dependents; recruits international students; advises the international club; runs the Friendship Family Program; coordinates the International Alumni Chapter; and offers training on immigration and cultural issues. Visa documents and many immigration services (such as work authorization and permission to take a reduced course load) are granted through SEVIS, the Student and Exchange Visitor Information System, run by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. The staff at the OISS have in-depth knowledge on immigration matters and serve as the designated officers under the SEVIS system. The OISS also represents the

university on international issues with a variety of government agencies (USCIS, USDHS, DOS, IRS, DMV. etc.) and international organizations. Visa services provided by the OISS include the following:

- F-1 Student Visa - the OISS issues the I-20 documents used by students to apply for an F-1 visa; an F-1 student is typically seeking a degree and must study full time.
- J-1 Student Visa - a DS-2019 form is issued for students sponsored by international agencies, home governments, or short-term exchange programs.
- J-1 Scholar Visa - a DS-2019 form is requested by university departments to obtain a J-1 work visa for visiting researchers, professors, and/or specialists.
- H-1B Visa - The OISS represents university departments wishing to hire international faculty in specialty occupations for 1-6 years.
- Green Cards - the OISS represents university departments wishing to hire permanent international faculty that qualify under the "Outstanding Professor and Researchers" category.
- Miscellaneous visas - there are numerous visa categories, and the OISS provides advice on changing visa status and exploring visa options for those wishing to study at the University of Nevada, Reno.

There are approximately 720 international students and 250 international researchers and professors representing 75 nations from around the world at the University of Nevada, Reno. New international students and scholars should check in at the OISS upon their arrival with passports and visa documents. Course Numbers

Lower-division (100- and 200-level courses)

Open to freshmen and sophomores, may satisfy prerequisite requirements for upper-division courses.

Upper-division (300- and 400-level courses)

Mainly for juniors and seniors, may require prerequisites. Freshmen and sophomores are not permitted to take upper-division courses without permission from their adviser or academic departments.

Graduate-level (courses numbered 500-799)

Open to graduate-level students only.

Section Numbers

Footnotes provide important information about a class section. Modular classes are identified in the footnote. These are usually short courses which start at various times during the semester. Registrations and drops are processed without penalty any time before the start of a modular class. Be sure to check the footnotes at the end of each department listing for additional information.

Section numbers beginning with an "H" designate honors sections. These sections are only open to students who have been admitted to the honors program.

CALL Numbers

This is the five-digit number you use to register for each class. If the CALL number is not listed (field is blank), you must contact the department BEFORE REGISTERING to get the correct CALL number. These CALL numbers are not available from the Office of Admissions and Records.

Credit Maximums Per Semester

- Nondegree students: eight undergraduate-level credits (Courses numbered 1-499)
- Undergraduates: 21 undergraduate-level credits (Courses numbered 1-499)

- Graduates: 16 credits (Courses numbered 500 and above)

Students may not enroll in more than the maximum number of credits via ePAWS. For undergraduates and graduates, permission of the college dean is required for credit overloads. Approval must be presented in person in the Office of Admissions and Records. Registration is audited on a regular basis. Students attempting to register for more than the maximum number of credits will have their registrations cancelled.

Upper-Division Business Courses

Advance Course Approvals Prerequisites and Attendance Requirements

You must obtain adviser approval and, as required, satisfy the course and/or test score placement prerequisite for your registration to be valid when you pay fees. **Each department is authorized to cancel the registration of any student who does not:**

- Satisfy the course or test score placement prerequisites
- Attend class during the first week of instruction
- Obtain prior permission to register for more than one section of a class.
